Overview and welcome

On 2 May 2024, residents of West Yorkshire will be able to vote for the next Mayor of the West Yorkshire Combined Authority.

The Mayor will work alongside the five partner local authorities (Bradford, Calderdale, Kirklees, Leeds and Wakefield) on matters that affect everyone in West Yorkshire including transport, housing, skills and the economy.

The Mayor is also responsible for the functions of the Police and Crime Commissioner for West Yorkshire and is able to appoint a Deputy Mayor for Policing and Crime.

This booklet has been sent to every registered elector as required by law and contains details of the candidates you can vote for.

How you can vote

At your polling station

Before **2 May 2024** you should have received a poll card which includes the address of your polling station. You can only vote at the polling station stated on your poll card. You do not need to take the poll card with you to vote, but it may save time if you do.

You need to take a valid form of photo ID with you to the polling station – you will not be able to vote without this.

You can also find out where your polling station is located by visiting www.wheredoivote.co.uk.

Voting by post

If you have asked for a postal vote, your postal ballot pack will be sent to you around 19 April 2024. If you applied near to the postal vote application deadline, your pack will be sent to you around 24 April 2024.

You must return your postal vote so that it reaches the Local Returning Officer by 10pm on Thursday 2 May 2024. To make sure your postal vote is counted it is recommended you post it in a Royal Mail post box no later than Tuesday 30 April 2024.

New rules mean your postal vote will be rejected if it is not returned correctly.

If you miss the post, you can only hand-deliver your postal vote to the Local Returning Officer at the locations specified in the contact details at the back page of this booklet, or at a polling station within the relevant ward of the local authority before **10pm on Thursday 2 May 2024.**

Anyone hand-delivering postal votes will be required to complete a form. The staff in the polling station or Electoral Services Office will help with this. You may hand-deliver your own and no more than five other postal votes per election. If you are a campaigner, you can only hand in your own postal vote, and those of close relatives or people for whom you provide regular care.

Apply to vote by post or proxy

Anyone who is registered to vote can apply to vote by post, or appoint someone they trust to vote on their behalf as a proxy. New applications for a postal vote must have been received by the Electoral Registration Officer for the local authority area in which you live by **5pm on Wednesday 17 April 2024**. If by the time you receive this booklet the postal vote deadline has passed, there is still time to appoint someone you trust to vote on your behalf as a proxy. **The deadline to make an application for a proxy vote is 5pm on Wednesday 24 April 2024.**

In certain circumstances, emergency proxy voting may be available after the ordinary proxy deadline of Wednesday 24 April 2024. The deadline to make an emergency proxy application is 5pm on 2 May 2024.

You can find more information, request application forms, or download them at www.gov.uk/vote-uk-election, or by using the Electoral Registration Officer contact details for your local authority at the end of this booklet. Application forms must be returned to your Electoral Registration Office in the local authority area in which you live.

Remember your photo ID

You will need to show photo ID to vote at polling stations on 2 May 2024.

You will only need to show one form of ID. It must be the original version and not a photocopy. You can still use your photo ID if it's out of date, as long as it looks like you. The name on your ID should be the same name you used to register to vote.

- Passport issued by the UK, the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man, a British Overseas Territory, an EEA state or a Commonwealth country (including an Irish Passport Card)
- Driving licence issued by the UK, any of the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man, or an EEA state (includes a provisional driving licence)
- A Blue Badge
- Older Person's Bus Pass funded by the UK Government
- Disabled Person's Bus Pass funded by the UK Government
- Oyster 60+ Card funded by the funded by the UK Government
- Freedom Pass
- Scottish National Entitlement Card issued for the purpose of concessionary travel (including a 60+, disabled or under 22s bus pass)
- 60 and Over Welsh Concessionary Travel Card
- Disabled Person's Welsh Concessionary Travel Card
- Senior SmartPass issued in Northern Ireland
- Registered Blind SmartPass or Blind Person's SmartPass issued in Northern Ireland
- War Disablement SmartPass issued in Northern Ireland
- 60+ SmartPass issued in Northern Ireland
- Half Fare SmartPass issued in Northern Ireland
- Identity card bearing the Proof of Age Standards Scheme hologram (a PASS card)
- Biometric immigration document
- Ministry of Defence Form 90 (Defence Identity Card)
- National identity card issued by an EEA state
- Electoral Identity Card issued in Northern Ireland
- Voter Authority Certificate
- Anonymous Elector's Document

Apply for a free photo ID

You can apply for a free voter ID document, known as a Voter Authority Certificate through the Government website: www.gov.uk/voting-photo-id. The deadline to apply for free voter ID for the elections on Thursday 2 May is 5pm on Wednesday 24 April.

At the polling stations

On Thursday 2 May 2024, polling stations will be open between 7am and 10pm for you to cast your vote.

When you arrive at the polling station you will be asked for your name and address, as well as a valid form of photo ID. Staff will check you are on the electoral register and give you the ballot papers for the elections taking place in your area at which you are entitled to vote.

The voting system

You can only vote for one candidate.

The candidate with most votes will win. This is called the 'first past the post' voting system. The result of the election will be declared on Saturday 4 May 2024.

The role of the Mayor

The Mayor represents 2.4 million residents across the region and works with council leaders, business representatives and partners and is the directly elected Chair of the existing West Yorkshire Combined Authority.

The Mayor provides a single voice for West Yorkshire, and has powers and responsibilities in relation to transport, economic development, provision of skills training and housing.

The Mayor's remit also includes the functions of the Police and Crime Commissioner and the ability to appoint a Deputy Mayor for Policing and Crime. This includes listening to the needs of communities, setting the objectives for the police force, and holding the Chief Constable to account.

The creation of the Mayor was made possible through a devolution deal, which was agreed by West Yorkshire's five council leaders and the Government in March 2020 and became law in January 2021. Further devolution arrangements were announced in the Spring 2024 budget.

The next mayoral term runs from 2024 until 2028.

The role of the West Yorkshire Combined Authority

The West Yorkshire Combined Authority brings together the five district council areas of Bradford, Calderdale, Kirklees, Leeds, and Wakefield to work together on areas that affect everyone in West Yorkshire including transport, housing, skills and the economy.

The elected Mayor is a member of the Combined Authority and chairs its meetings. The other members will continue to be:

- Five councillors – one from each of the five district councils across the region
- One member from the City of York Council as a non-constituent council
- Three additional, elected representatives from opposition groups jointly appointed by the five district councils across the region
- One member nominated by the West Yorkshire Business Board and appointed by the Combined Authority

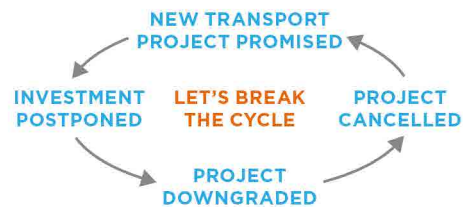

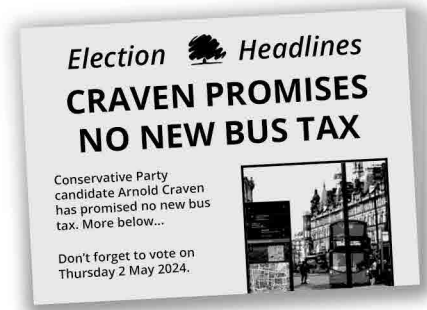
